Free Surgical cum Medical Camp - A Report

(March 2, 2025 to March 8, 2025)

The *Shri Onkar Singh Memorial Trust (SOSMT)* conducted a free surgical cum medical camp in the sacred ashram of Devaraha Hans Baba in Bhagdevar village, Vindhyachal, District Mirzapur (UP) between March 2, 2025 and March 8, 2025, both days inclusive. This was the sixty-eighth camp by the Trust and our tenth such in these hallowed environs in Vindhyachal. We held our last camp here in November-December 2023. With our present camp, the Trust has entered its twenty-sixth year of continuous selfless service to the poor and the needy.

The Background

We could not hold a surgical camp in Vindhyachal last year (2024) because of our concentration in the Uttarakhand and Jammu regions. However, we did appreciate the need for a surgical camp in this region which abounds in economically poor and physically needy people. Hence we decided to hold our first camp of the year here only. Lately, Vindhyachal came into prominence because of the Kumbha Mela at Prayagraj which is only about a hundred kilometres away from here.

The Spadework

It was during the Kumbha Mela that Dr Charak twice visited the ashram of the Hans Baba in Bhagdevar village in Vindhyachal. The Baba was keen that a surgical cum medical camp be held there soon, as we had not done so the previous year. Dr Charak, during his visit to the ashram found large crowds of people in Vindhyachal causing massive traffic jams. It was difficult to enter and exit Vindhyachal right until the middle of the month of February. The reason was the Kumbha Mela at Prayagraj which was to continue till the twenty-sixth of February. Prayagraj during the Kumbha was visited by some six hundred and fifty million people (nearly half the population of India). Several of them also visited the Vindhyavasini temple at Vindhyachal after the Kumbha. The trains on the route were overcrowded. We were apprehensive about whether we would be able to make it to the venue of the camp on time even though our camp was to start after the conclusion of the Kumbha. We actually did face some problems but luckily they got managed.

We had conducted nine surgical camps at Vindhyachal in the past. So there was not much problem about the organisation of the camp. Only some old contacts had to be refreshed, approval had to be sought for the conduct of the camp from the CMO of the Mirzapur district, availability of some operation theatre equipment (operation table, instrument trolleys, etc.) had to be ensured, and the material from the tent house (curtains, chairs, tables, cots, etc.) had to be ordered. All this was done and ensured during the two visits to Vindhyachal by Dr Charak.

The Finances

Arrival at Vindhyachal: Setting up the Camp

Our team started from the New Delhi station on the evening of March 1, 2025, by Magadh Express and reached Vindhyachal the next morning. From there they took local transport to the ashram of the Hans Baba and reached there by around 7:30 AM. However, things did not go as smoothly as they have done on earlier occasions. Because of the unprecedented rush in the trains, it so happened this time that five of our team members who were on the waiting list could not get confirmation of their seats in the Magadh Express train by which most of our team members were to travel from Delhi to Vindhyachal on the evening of March 1, 2025. Normally the information about such confirmation or otherwise is made available some three or four hours before the departure of the train. So we came to know by around five o'clock in the evening on March 1 that five of our members would not be able to join the team. This would be a disaster as the camp would not be possible without them. Dr Charak made a quick decision. He called four of them to his residence, took out his car and drove them all to Vindhyachal during the night, a distance of over 760 kilometres from Delhi. They reached the venue of the camp ahead of the rest of the team. The fifth member managed to travel against the seat reserved for Dr Charak. Dr Vivek, from Jabalpur, joined the team on his own at Vindhyachal.

The team settled in the residential area of the ashram. The ambulance from Nougran had already reached there the previous day. The team members soon started their work. The operation theatre was made ready and the linen and instruments autoclaved. The generator was put in order as it would be required in the event of power failure which is not unusual here. Some operation room equipment had to be procured from the hospital of Dr Guru Prasad. Over the past years we have been using one operation table and some instrument trolleys from the hospital of Dr Prasad. The OPD work was started on the morning of March 2, 2025. The operative work was to be started on Monday, March 3. The kitchen team this time was exclusively from Jammu, and they arrived at Vindhyachal by our ambulance.

Camp Activities

A total of 636 patients attended our OPD. Operative work had to be started from Monday onwards. Dr Dutta, the physician, and Dr Sarkar, the surgeon, were to be with us only till Wednesday, i.e., March 5. Dr Vivek who joined us on his own at Vindhyachal was to remain with us till Thursday, March 6. So we decided that we would try to finish maximum work till the morning of Thursday as there would be a shortage of manpower after that. Because of this constraint, we had to continue our operative work for long hours. On Tuesday, March 4, our operations continued till well past midnight, almost till 2:30 AM on Wednesday, March 5. We are grateful to our team members who tirelessly worked for long hours and made the camp a success. The one member who deserves special praise for her work is sister Veena, the OR nurse, who single-handedly managed the operation theatre and assisted almost each surgery without the slightest indication of being tired or annoyed, starting well before 9 o'clock on Tuesday and ending around 2:30 AM on Wednesday, only to restart her work from Wednesday morning 9 o'clock onwards!

A total of fifty-seven surgical procedures, forty of them major, were performed during the five operative days (from Monday to Friday). As usual, there were several patients who reported late and could not be accommodated within our available time frame. They would be operated upon during our next camps.

Return to Delhi

Because of the general rush in the trains to Prayagraj due to the just concluding Kumbha Mela, we had problem getting train reservation from Vindhyachal. So we hired a minibus from Vindhyachal to Prayagraj on March 8, 2025 afternoon. Most of the team members thus reached Prayagraj from where we were able to get train reservation to Delhi. All the team members reached Delhi the next day. Because Dr Charak had travelled to Vindhyachal by car, he drove back to Delhi on the afternoon of March 8 and reached Delhi just after midnight on March 9. Dr Sawhney and Tara Singh accompanied him.

Future Plans

Our next surgical camp is already scheduled for March 23, 2025 to March 28, 2025. The venue will be Nougran, in Jammu district of the Jammu Province.
